Great news! The American Battlefield Trust (ABT) has once again named the CWRT of Eastern Pa., Inc. as a Color Bearer. This honor is limited to 1,400 groups/individuals which, together, raise 50 percent of funds used by the ABT for battlefield preservation. Karl Lehr and His Legacy of Honor, Commitment to Service and Generosity



Each September, we honor the late Karl Lehr. His bequest of \$123,955, which has influenced many battlefield preservation victories and, more than 10 years later, continues to help distinguish our Round Table as an American Battlefield Trust Top 300 Donor.

Born in Allentown, Karl was a 1936 graduate of Muhlenberg

College. During World War II, he held the rank of Technical Sergeant and helped shape history during three major invasions:

- He took part in two landings in Italy (Sicily and Salerno) in 1943.
- He was at Normandy on June 6, 1944, serving as a member of the First Signal Detachment on the *USS Ancon*, the flagship for the Omaha Beach landing.

He later became Sergeant of the Eiffel Tower Guard and was a staff member of the U.S. Army University in England.

Post-war, Karl participated in the Fulbright teacher exchange, a program of the U.S. Department of State. He also taught in Cologne, Germany, in 1957-58 and, afterward, taught for 42 years in New Jersey and Illinois.

Karl was a member of the Civil War Round Table of Eastern Pa. Inc. for about 30 years. Almost immediately after "enlisting," he began what would become decades of dedication to our mission by:

- submitting newsletter items
- serving as field trip co-chair
- speaking in front of our group and, as a member of the Resource Committee, outside groups
- serving as a content expert for the community
- serving as a board member
- helping to form our Preservation and Restoration Committee. (Our records show his commitment by way of signed petitions to save the Grove Farm at Antietam and monetary donations to various organizations as threats to historic sites became known.)



September 16, 1864 The Beefsteak Raid a.k.a. The Great Cattle Raid at Harrison's Landing




The great cattle raid, a 100-mile ride to acquire cattle intended for consumption by the Union Army, was led by Major General Wade Hampton. The raid took place during the combined siege of Richmond and Petersburg. Several certified Texas cattle thieves were reportedly among the 3,000 troopers under Hampton. About 2,500 of the beeves were captured, as were 11 wagons and 304 prisoners. Total Confederate losses during the raid included 10 killed, 47 wounded and 4 missing; the official cattle count after successfully reaching the Confederate line was 2,468. During the raid, a Union force was immediately dispatched under General David McMurtrie Gregg to pursue the "saucy rebs," but did not succeed in overtaking them.

Although the raid was a success, the Confederates lacked the hay and grain to feed the cattle and so, were forced to slaughter the entire herd almost immediately. Local southerners, who also partook in the feast, were known to have traded some meat with Union sentries in return for items that, by now, were considered by them to be luxuries.
