

Christmas during the Civil War

Officially, Christmas Day did not become a national holiday until Ulysses S. Grant declared it so in 1870, in his capacity as president of the United States. He knew that both North and South celebrated Christmas and, true to his unofficial campaign slogan, "Let us have peace," he signed the national holiday into law in the hope the act would help to reunite the country.

But it seems that at least some secret Santas (well, maybe not so secret) had been hard at work behind wartime scenes, years before the holiday was declared official, with intentions similar to Grant's. Stories abound, like the 90 Michigan soldiers who loaded wagons full of food and other surprises and distributed the items around the Georgia countryside under the power of mules that were adorned about the head with branches to mimic antlers.

▶ Digging through the treasure trove of Civil War telegram drafts yielded what may have possibly been the best Christmas gift ever:

"To his excellency, President Lincoln.


I beg to present you as a Christmas gift the city of Savannah with 150 heavy guns and plenty of ammunition and also about 25,000 bales of cotton."

W. T. Sherman, Brig. Gen'l, Dec 22, 1864

And, because etiquette demanded that gifts be property acknowledged, Lincoln naturally bowed to convention by replying to Sherman with his own telegram on December 26, which included, among other things, the following statement:

"My dear General Sherman:

... Many, many thanks for your Christmas gift in the capture of Savannah. ..." Yours very truly A. LINCOLN.



CWRT of Eastern Pa. Donates Even More Battlefield Preservation Funds

This article provides details about a second round of battlefield preservation donations using Campaign 43 funds. (The details of the first round of funding were shared in our October, 2021, newsletter.)

At its October 26 meeting, the Board of Directors of the CWRT of Eastern Pa., Inc. voted to donate additional funding for battlefield preservation, adding another \$5,00 to an already-released Campaign 43 sum of \$4,500. Here is a brief summary of the latest donations and where your raffle purchases and donated funds will go:

Phase II of the Gaines' Mill and Cold Harbor Saved Forever Campaign

Civil War Round Table of Eastern Pa., Inc. donation: \$250 Total donation post-matching funds (matched at \$3.25 to 1) \$819

Once the American Battlefield Trust (ABT) completed Phase I of this project, saving 108 acres, it moved to what it expects to be a multi-year Phase II to preserve 99 acres of land at the intersection of the battlefields of Gaines' Mill and Cold Harbor. According to the Emerging Civil War's website, one of the most fascinating parts of Richmond National Battlefield is that the 1862 battlefield of Gaines' Mill sits perpendicular to the 1864 battle of Cold Harbor—on the same ground! NOTE: The ABT recently announced that, while in the process of engaging around Phase II activities, it was alerted of an opportunity to secure 51 acres where Second Deep Bottom was fought, southeast of Richmond. Ultimately, the ABT decided to incorporate the Second Deep Bottom acreage into the Phase II project described above.

Critical Acres at Manassas National Battlefield Park

Civil War Round Table of Eastern Pa., Inc. donation: \$250
Total donation post-matching funds (matched at \$5.13 to 1) \$1,282.50



The ABT had previously saved more than 370 acres of hallowed ground at the Manassas Battlefield. Now, it has the opportunity to save a small parcel of battlefield land (3.5 acres) in the northern part of the park, near the Sudley Church (pictured left) where the Union Army set up a field hospital and where, later, the 21st Georgia regiment used the church as a hospital.






December, 2021, Civil War Book Releases
