From the Brigade Commander

Since our last newsletter, we've received several bits of great news from the American Battlefield Trust (ABT):

- * A Campaign 44 donation (\$500) by the CWRT of Eastern Pa. helped the ABT to successfully conclude a 15-year, \$12 million effort to save the 208-acre Slaughter Pen Farm—the spot where the Battle of Fredericksburg hung in the balance and was ultimately won and lost.
- * Our CWRT is now a member of the ABT's 25-Year Club, which is comprised of dedicated battlefield preservationists who have lent their financial support for 25 years or more.
- * By the end of 2021, the ABT had acquired and preserved more than 54,000 American battlefield acres! Remember: Preservation isn't won in the courts; it's won one dollar at a time from sources like your CWRT membership dues, donations and raffle ticket purchases.



March 3, 1863

America's First Compulsory Conscription Act is Signed

About a year after the C.S.A. passed a conscription law (April 16, 1862), the U.S.A. followed suit with one of its own. In the latter case, men, ages 20 to 45, including aliens with intention of becoming citizens, were conscripted, although both Union and Confederate conscription laws allowed for exemptions, including the very unpopular measure of substitutes, which allowed wealthy men to pay someone in their stead and led to draft riots in New York City. $(\text{cont} \rightarrow)$



That same spring, the federal bounty was increased to \$300 in the hope of boosting volunteerism and reducing the number of men who might need to be drafted. As you might expect, those who responded to the bounties were primarily from the lower economic strata of society.

Conscription was not new to America. In 1792, all able-bodied male citizens were required to purchase a gun and join their local state militia. But there was no penalty for noncompliance with this

act. Congress has also passed a conscription act during the War of 1812, but the war ended before the act was ratified.

Civil War Redux: Battlefield Being Invaded by Feral Hogs

"Roan Catlett never ate hog after the Cross Keys fight. He'd vomit if he smelled it cooking. They got loose in the woods after Cross Keys and ate the Yankee dead. But that first spring of the war, when the Valley companies marched up the Shenandoah to take the arsenal at Harpers Ferry, Roan was still a powerful hog-eating man."

Soldiers that survived a battle faced a host of horrors in the aftermath, including fighting off wild hogs after darkness fell. Following the Battle of Prairie Grove, Confederates piled up many of their dead on the field and fashioned makeshift barriers around the dead, hoping to keep the feral pigs from eating the corpses. Pvt. Johnny Hess, C.S.A. wrote in his diary that he would see hogs on the mountains, in the thickets, at the edge of the woods ... waiting patiently to eat the faces of the dead and wounded after darkness had covered the battlefields. At Shiloh, Johnny wrote that he'd learned the locals refused to eat hog because they knew the animals had been living off the dead.

More than 150 years later, roving wild hogs on battlefield land are once again in the news. ($cont \rightarrow$)

Following last May's record cresting of the Mississippi River, wildlife was forced into new habitats, including Vicksburg National Military Park. Officials fear the hogs could undermine the national cemetery and the trenches and earthworks on the bluffs above the river and otherwise root up the landscape.

- * Morning: John Brown's War, featuring U.S. arsenal and armory sites outbreak of war and Gen. T. J. Jackson and Confederate occupation of spring, 1861 • the mystery of the U.S. Cavalry escape during the battle of September, 1862 • life in a border town, with the Potomac River serving as an international boundary between the U.S.A. and the C.S.A.
- Afternoon: 1862 C.S.A. invasion; Jackson's siege and capture of Harpers Ferry prelude to Antietam • battlefield site visits to Bolivar Heights, Camp Hill and School House Ridge.

A \$10, non-refundable deposit is required to reserve your place, cash or check. (Make your check payable to "Civil War Round Table of Eastern Pa., Inc.")

* Other important details:

Shuttle buses may be available to us, at least some of the time. The Park also offers some wheelchairs on a first-come, first-serve basis.

You will **not** need to provide an immunization record, but all visitors **will be required** to wear a mask in all National Park Services buildings, crowded outdoor spaces, and in all forms of enclosed, public transportation.

It looks like we'll brown-bag it for lunch. Don't forget to pack bottled or canned beverages for your personal consumption during the day. **NOTE**: The consumption of alcoholic beverages and/or the possession of an open container of alcoholic beverage is prohibited in the park.

Carpool departure time: The current estimated departure is **no later than** 4:30 p.m. so those driving back the same day can at least get close to home before dark.
