"The Expulsion of Jews: General Grant's Infamous Order No. 11" AND "The Brains of the Confederacy: a Jew Named Judah Benjamin."

Tuesday, November 1, 2022

Part I: With intent to enforce the Lincoln administration's blockade to cut off the Confederacy from all trade with the North, General Grant issued General Order #11, which stated: "The Jews, as a class, violating every regulation of trade established by the Treasury Department, and also Department orders, are hereby expelled from the Department."

Part II: As Jefferson Davis's right-hand man, Judah P. Benjamin was quite possibly the most important Jew of the 19th century. He was also the most widely hated one in the North and in portions of the South.



Rich Rosenthal is the President of the North Jersey Civil War Round Table and worked closely with pre-eminent historian and author, John T. Cunningham, a founder of the North Jersey American Revolution Round Table. Rich has presented numerous

lectures on a wide variety of historical subjects and is making a return to speak at our Round Table meeting. He resides in Parsippany, NJ, with his wife, Harriet.

The Trent Affair:

The Respected Navy Navigator and Explorer Who Nearly Plunged the Union into War with Britain



Fifteen-year-old Charles Wilkes entered the U. S. Navy in 1818 as a midshipman. By 1826, he had been promoted to the rank of lieutenant. In 1838, he was selected to lead the first U.S. Exploring Expedition to the Pacific Ocean, an event also known as the "Wilkes Expedition."

By any measure of the day, the Expedition was a rousing success. He and his fleet of six vessels surveyed Antarctica and Hawaii; his crew included experts in the fields of botany, philology (study of language), horticulture, conchology (study of shells) and mineralogy. His fleet later explored Puget Sound and then the "river of the west" (the Columbia).

Apparently, naming (or renaming) everything in sight served as great amusement for Wilkes. So was excessive use of the cat-o'-nine-tails on

members of his crew. Harsh treatment that resulted in the death of several crew members ultimately led to his first court-martial. One year later, however, he was promoted to commander. In 1855, he would be promoted to the rank of captain.

The outbreak of the Civil War brought an interruption to Wilkes' scientific work.

One month after being detached from expedition program duty, he received orders to take command of the steam-powered frigate *San Jacinto*. He arrived on board his new command at Monrovia, Liberia, and set sail for the U.S. by way of the West Indies, in search of the Southern commerce raider, *CSS Sumter*. During a stop in Cuba to take on a supply of coal, Wilkes learned that Confederate commissioners to France and England were in Havana, awaiting transport to Europe aboard the British mail steamer *Trent*. Their purpose: lobbying for the Confederacy. It's been suggested that, Wilkes, while in a state of tipsiness, had tipped his hand to dining partners while still in Cuba, saying that he intended to catch up with the commissioners. And Wilkes did just that on November 8: He forced the ship to stop by firing two shots across the *Trent's* bow and seized the commissioners and their secretaries. The *San Jacinto* and its prisoners then headed home to Boston, where the commissioners were taken to Fort Warren and imprisoned.

News of the capture raised furious rage within the Confederacy and equal levels of enthusiasm in the North, which was still smarting from the summer's loss at Bull Run. But soon, everyone realized that Captain Wilkes' act of seizing a neutral ship was in violation of a principle that had led the United States to declare war against England in 1812. Fortunately, more sober-minded citizens were able to prevail, with some just-in-time aid from a fortunate communications malfunction that delayed Britain's initial reaction from reaching Washington for a month. By then, emotions on both sides had cooled, and a well-worded apology from Secretary of State William Seward, following a meeting with the British minister to the U.S. in December, settled the matter.

In January, the commissioners were set free. For his offense, Wilkes was once again court-martialed, suspended and placed on the retired list. Two years later, still on the retired list, he was promoted to the rank of rear admiral.
