

A Special Civil War Exhibit on Display at our May, 2024, Meeting by Alan Lowcher

You may want to mark your calendars right now to remind yourself to join us for our May 7 meeting. In addition to the usual dinner option and lecture will be a special exhibit curated by Round Table members Alan Lowcher and Jack Stanley. Here's a teaser of what's to come:

In keeping with the dinner theme of our meetings, the items on display will be a brought-to-life reincarnation of an 1863 photograph (right) of noncommissioned officers of Co D 93 New York infantry dinner mess. The exhibit will include a basic cooking mess exhibit using original tinware and the oftenused Sibley tripod and stove. (The stove, designed by Henry Hopkins Sibley, is a story in itself).

The display will also include an original officer's campaign desk with many officer accoutrements as well as several original uniforms, field gear, and an interesting local item or two.



And, of course, no display would be complete without a few regimental instruments to keep the troops marching along.

April, **2024**, **presentation synopsis** (*Item continued from page 3*)

In response to the Confederate attack on Fort Sumter, President Lincoln made a speech, requesting a 75,000-man army to suppress the rebellion. Mr. Reed's talk discusses the two things that happened in direct response to Lincoln's speech:

- 1) A country possessing a 16,000-man army in the process of splitting in two, an atrophied militia system, and no general staff or mobilization plan actually produced that army, in very short order. He describes the pivotal role of the New York Militia and the under-appreciated contributions of individuals such as Joseph Holt, General John Wool, and John Dix.
- 2) Seven slave states that, until then, had remained loyal, reconsidered their commitment to the Union. In the end, four of these states (VA, NC, AR, TN) departed the Union while three (MO, KY, MD) remained under varying degrees of duress. It all made for a high-stakes drama with larger-than-life characters, dirty tricks, and some questionably legal actions by the Lincoln administration. Arguably, the outcome of the war hinged on these decisions.

Mr. Reed has studied this topic for five years. His book on this subject will be available either for sale or preorder.

A Story in Itself: The Sibley Stove



Although Henry Hopkins Sibley was not considered an upstanding military figure, he is a man of some renown, owing to his accomplishments before the Civil War.

History paints Sibley as a military leader prone to serious blunders, many of which are attributed to alcoholism; his later commands in the CSA (he left the U.S. Army to join the Confederacy after the war brought out) were largely relegated to minor roles. Eventually, he was court martialed (in 1863). His claim to fame came before war broke out: Sibley designed two of the most basic—and important—pieces of Civil War camp gear: The Sibley tent (above, patented in 1856) and the Sibley stove (shown inside the tent, patented in 1857).

The former was used by the U.S. Army beyond the Civil War for winter quarters and training camps. His stove was also used for many years after the Civil War: Stoves were repurposed to serve as smudge pots in Florida orange groves and remained in use until the advent of World War II.

Despite his inventions' usefulness to the military ... and beyond ... neither he nor his kin ever received a dime of royalties. Those who claim they can accurately calculate the money legally owned to Sibley places his estate's loss at \$100.000.
