

See you on February 7th when Dr. Paul Kahan will enlighten us about that "Amiable Scoundrel Lincoln's Scandalous Secretary of War" Pennsylvania's own Simon Cameron.

About Our February Speaker, Paul Kahan

Dr. Kahan earned a Ph.D. in U.S. history from Temple University where he worked with William W. Cutler, III. Prior to that, Dr. Kahan earned his M.A. in Modern American History & Literature from Drew University and B.A.s in history and English (with minors in medieval/Renaissance studies and music) from Alfred University.

In 2008, Dr. Kahan published his first book, *Eastern State Penitentiary: A History*. This book explores the penitentiary's history and is written for a popular audience. In February 2012, Peter Lang published Dr. Kahan's second book, *Seminary of Virtue: The Ideology and Practice of Inmate Reform at Eastern State Penitentiary, 1829-1971*. His third book, *The Homestead Strike: Labor, Violence, and American Industry*, was published by Routledge in late 2013. In 2016, Dr. Kahan published *The Bank War: Andrew Jackson, Nicholas Biddle, and the Fight for American Finance*, the first narrative overview of this turning point in American political history in more than half a century. Kahan's most recent book is *Amiable Scoundrel: Simon Cameron, Lincoln's Scandalous Secretary of War*.

About Paul Kahan's Talk... Amiable Scoundrel: Simon Cameron, **Lincoln's Scandalous Secretary of War**

From abject poverty to undisputed political boss of Pennsylvania, Lincoln's secretary of war, senator, chair of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, and a founder of the Republican Party, Simon Cameron (1799–1889) was one of the nineteenth century's most prominent political figures. In his wake, however, he left a series of questionable political and business dealings and, at the age of eighty, even a sex scandal.

Far more than a biography of Cameron, Amiable Scoundrel is also a portrait of an era that allowed—indeed, encouraged—a man such as Cameron to seize political control. The political changes of the early nineteenth century enabled him not only to improve his status but also to exert real political authority. The changes caused by the Civil War, in turn, allowed Cameron to consolidate his political authority into a successful, well-oiled political machine. A key figure in designing and implementing the Union's military strategy during the Civil War's crucial first year, Cameron played an essential role in pushing Abraham Lincoln to permit the enlistment of African Americans into the U.S. Army, a stance that eventually led to his forced resignation. Yet his legacy has languished, nearly forgotten save for the fact that his name has become shorthand for corruption, even though no evidence has ever been presented to prove that Cameron was corrupt.

Amiable Scoundrel puts Cameron's actions into a larger historical context by demonstrating that many politicians of the time, including Abraham Lincoln, used similar tactics to win elections and advance their careers. This study is the fascinating story of Cameron's life and an illuminating portrait of his times.

PRESERVATION GOAL by James Duffy

At the recent Board Meeting, it was decided to set a financial goal and share the progress toward this goal with the membership of the CWRT of Eastern PA. This is an effort to demonstrate to the members and benefactors of this Roundtable where the funds raised for Battlefield Preservation are going in their name.

At the 11/1 general meeting there was a bar graph set up in the back of the room that showed the goal (\$5000) for the Campaign Season of 2016 -2017. This bar graph will be updated at each meeting showing the progress toward this goal.

As of 11/1, the CWRT of Eastern PA has raised approximately \$1600 toward the goal of \$5000. Also shown is where donations in the name of this Roundtable have gone since the start of the Campaign season. Since the first meeting, \$125 was given to the Civil War Museum in Harrisburg and \$50 given to the Battle of Falling Waters Foundation (Maryland).



VALENTINE'S DAY IN CIVIL WAR TIMES Arkansas Toothpick.com- Dec 2007

I would also like to include something this month that one may find interesting: The switch from handmade to manufactured Valentine cards began during the 1840s. During the Civil War manufacturers were marketing Valentines to soldiers for their loved ones. During the Civil War there were special Valentines for soldiers and their sweethearts. Some showed couples parting ways. Others had a tent with flaps that opened to reveal a soldier. This was called a "Window Valentine". Another Civil War novelty was the Valentine that included a lock of hair. And another was the paper doll Valentine that had a painted face and feet, with the figure dressed in cloth or paper. Valentine cards became popular in the United States during the Civil War. Elaborate cards trimmed with satin ribbons, mother-of pearl ornaments, and spun glass were sold.

Within a few years of the War Between the States, Valentine's Day received almost as much attention as Christmas Day. Here is an example of a verse found in cards sent from soldiers in the field during the War:

"To horse!" the bugle sounds the call, The foe rage like waves at sea; If cruel fate should bid me fall, My last fond thought shall be of thee."

FASCINATING FEBRUARY FACTS- Civil War Institute

On February 12, 1809, Abraham Lincoln was born in Hodgenville, Kentucky. The self-educated lawyer served in the United States House of Representatives as a delegate from Illinois before being elected as the sixteenth president of the United States.

In February of 1861, the Confederacy formed a government at Montgomery, Alabama and appointed Jefferson Davis as President of the Confederate States of America.

The capital would soon be moved to Richmond, Virginia, following Virginia's secession that spring. President Davis would be formally inaugurated in February of 1862 to a term of 6 years.

In the West, Union General Ulysses S. Grant captured the Confederate strongholds at Fort Henry and Fort Donelson. These February 1862 battles gave the Union control of the vital Tennessee and Cumberland Rivers and helped General Grant rise to fame.

By February 1864, Prisoner of War camps were beginning to fill up due to the breakdown of the prisoner exchange program. The notorious Andersonville Prison in Georgia first opened its gates on February 27, 1864. Of the roughly 45,000 Union troops who would be interred there during the war, about 13,000 of them died due to poor sanitation, hunger, thirst, and exposure.

Earlier that month, over 100 Union officers escaped from Libby Prison in Richmond, Virginia. Over half of them managed to find their way to Union lines, while the other half were either recaptured or drowned during the escape.

February 1864 also saw the first successful submarine attack of the Civil War. The *CSS Hunley*, manned by seven confederate sailors, stuck a torpedo to the *USS Housatonic* in Charleston harbor. Both the *Hunley* and the *Housatonic* sank as a result of the explosion.
