Preservation by Joe Riggs

Discovering new information relating to my ancestor's regiment is my pastime. I enjoy working with and discovering original documents relating to his regiment. Over the years, visits to several small Wisconsin county historical societies, GAR Halls, libraries and such produce a wealth of new information. During these trips to Wisconsin, I realize much is being lost to the effects of age.

In my opinion, a missing section in the preservation conflict is saving the handwritten record of this war. Schools todays are dismissing cursive writing and reading in lieu completing everything on the computer. Soon, the old folks will be the few able to read cursive including our Declaration of Independence. The original records, diaries, letters and such are in cursive. In my research of my ancestor's regiment, I examine countless shoeboxes of cursive accounts covering the events of 1860-1865 then interpreting and transcribing these wonderful gems. Owning a Webster's 1864 dictionary also helps with the task. The English consider one hundred and fifty year old documents as modern history. However, they realize that time is running out and are employing over a thousand volunteers to transcribe and preserve older official papers. Should we follow their example? Our local historical societies are bursting as such. Consider the wealth of information at the Army War College, Gettysburg, Vicksburg or even the National Archives.

What must we require to begin transcribing these wonderful history treasures? A volunteer organization is essential; however, it is also necessary to have the cooperation of the depository. Oftentimes, this can be a problem where the curators may believe we are invading their turf. We all need to cooperate for our mutual benefit such as, the easy exchange of information via the internet and a new source of income for organizations storing and sharing the data.

Round Table members such as Richard Matthews (discovering the grave sites of nearly one thousand Civil War veterans), Lewis Schmidt (the 47th Pennsylvania), William Goble (New Jersey regiments), Ed Root (Nisky Hill GAR Civil War plot), Jeff Stocker (153d Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry) and others accomplish much; however, additional material is waiting for our discovery. I wonder if we and other organizations ought to involve ourselves in this side of preservation, or should we lazily wait and hope someone completes the assignment?

If you wonder what tidbits are waiting for discovery, here are two from my ancestor's regiment.

A Wisconsin private writes to his brother about his night in Nashville. "I had a really, really great night in Nashville. Do not tell mom. This is our secret." Translation: I passed the night drinking and with hookers.

Wisconsin serves as the rear guard during the disastrous Red River retreat. They destroy everything of value and strategic importance such as bridges, food supplies and plantations. At one plantation, they discover the owner's stash of gold coins. There's enough loot for everyman in the detachment to receive a \$20 gold piece.

Should we allow this opportunity to pass and not preserve our local wealth of Civil War data?

About Our January Speaker, Timothy Sedore

Timothy Sedore is a northerner, a Union man and Professor of English at The City University of New York, Bronx Community College, where he teaches undergraduate courses in composition, literature and religious rhetoric. He was raised in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, but he has Southern roots. His father, from the North, met his mother, from the South, at a USO dance during World War Two, and formed a union--if you will—that lasted 56 years.

His book, *An Illustrated Guide to Virginia's Confederate Monuments* was published in 2011 by the Southern Illinois University Press. His second book, *Tennessee Civil War Monuments*, is in press under contract with the University of Tennessee Press. Once completed, his book-in-progress, *Mississippi Civil War Monuments* will complete a trilogy on Civil War monumentation.

He was ordained to the ministry in 2011 and is active in campus ministries and preaching engagements at various churches. His study of the life, ministry and impact of the Rev. Norman Vincent Peale is in progress.



About Timoth Sedore's January Program.... Virginia's Confederate Monuments

As America was torn apart by the horrors of the Civil War, no state bore the brunt of battle more than Virginia. Home to the Confederate capitol of Richmond and the linchpin of the eastern theater of the war, the state now bears a myriad of testaments to its harrowing past, waiting to be explored. Tablets, monoliths, courthouses, cemeteries, town squares, battlefields, and more are cataloged in detail throughout this compendium, accompanied by photographs and meticulous commentary. Each entry also contains descriptions, historical information, and location, providing a complete portrait of each site. Designed for the expert historian and the lay reader alike, the vast scope of these locations-from Clinch Mountain near Tennessee to the Eastern Shore, from the northern Virginia suburbs of Washington, D.C., to the edge of North Carolina-is organized geographically by region for ease of use. Six maps also are provided for the reader's orientation.

Much more than a visual tapestry or a tourist's handbook, however, *An Illustrated Guide to Virginia's Confederate Monuments* draws on scholarly and field research to reveal these sites not only as monuments to history but also as public efforts to reconcile mourning with Southern postwar ideologies. Unveiled here are dynamic memorials that are at once intimate and aloof, written on stone, bronze, or marble but forged from the language of suffering. Sedore analyzes in depth the nature of these attempts to publicly explain Virginia's sense of grief after the war, delving deep into the psychology of a traumatized area. Insight into these evocative elegies for lost sons, fathers, spouses, and other loved ones provides yet another dimension to this captivating volume.

The first book of its kind, *An Illustrated Guide to Virginia's Confederate Monuments* will appeal to the traveler, historian, and armchair enthusiast alike. Never before has such a comprehensive collection of Virginia's Southern Civil War sites been gathered and examined in one volume. From commemorations of famous generals to memories of unknown soldiers, from the Shenandoah Valley to the Chesapeake Bay, the dead speak from the pages of this sweeping companion to history.

PRESERVATION GOAL by James Duffy

At the recent Board Meeting, it was decided to set a financial goal and share the progress toward this goal with the membership of the CWRT of Eastern PA. This is an effort to demonstrate to the members and benefactors of this Roundtable where the funds raised for Battlefield Preservation are going in their name.

At the 11/1 general meeting there was a bar graph set up in the back of the room that showed the goal (\$5000) for the Campaign Season of 2016 -2017. This bar graph will be updated at each meeting showing the progress toward this goal.

As of 11/1, the CWRT of Eastern PA has raised approximately \$1600 toward the goal of \$5000. Also shown is where donations in the name of this Roundtable have gone since the start of the Campaign season. Since the first meeting, \$125 was given to the Civil War Museum in Harrisburg and \$50 given to the Battle of Falling Waters Foundation (Maryland).

REMEMBERING THE BATTLE OF NASHVILLE, TN-DEC 15, 1864-DEC 16, 1864



On this day in 1864, the once powerful Confederate Army of Tennessee is nearly destroyed when a Union army commanded by General George Thomas swarms over the Rebel trenches around Nashville. The Battle of Nashvillewas thefinale in a disastrous year for General John Bell Hood's Confederates. The Rebels lost a long summer campaign for Atlanta in September 1864 when Hood abandoned the city to the army of William T. Sherman. Hood then took his diminished force north into Tennessee. He hoped to draw Sherman out of the Deep South, but Sherman had enough troops to split his force and send part of it to chase Hood into Tennessee. In November, Sherman took the remainder of his army on his march across Georgia. On November 30, Hood attacked the troops of General John Schofield at Franklin, Tennessee. The Confederates suffered heavy casualties and much of the army's leadership structure was destroyed: Twelve

generals were killed or wounded along with 60 regimental leaders. When Schofield moved north to Nashville to join Thomas, Hood followed him and dug his army in outside of Nashville's formidable defenses.

Thomas saw his chance to deal a decisive blow to Hood. More than 50,000 Yankees faced a Rebel force that now totaled less than 20,000. Historians have long questioned why Hood even approached the strongly fortified city with the odds so stacked against him. Early in the morning of December 15, Thomas sent a force under General James Steedman against the Confederates' right flank. The Union troops overran the Confederate trenches and drove the Rebels back more than a mile. The short December day halted the fighting, but Thomas struck again on December 16. This time, the entire Confederate line gave way and sent Hood's men from the field in a total rout. Only General Stephen Lee's valiant rear-guard action prevented complete destruction of the Confederate army.

More than 6,000 Rebels were killed or wounded and 3,000 Yankees lost their lives. Hood and his damaged army retreated to Mississippi, the Army of Tennessee no longer a viable offensive fighting force.
